### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

### **CLASS POLICIES:**

- A. Should the students fail to submit requirements,
- 1. They will be given a score of zero (0) with a corresponding grade of zero percent (0%) in a requirement which is not submitted, under the following conditions:
